Victoria Traynor

Victoria Traynor brings a wealth of expertise to her role as Professor of Dementia Care at Warrigal, complementing her position as Professor of Healthy Ageing at the University of the Sunshine Coast. As the Founding Director of the Aged and Dementia Health Education Research (ADHERE) Centre, she has dedicated three decades to advancing the understanding and support of older adults, with a particular focus on individuals living with dementia and their family caregivers.

Her professional journey began in 1992 in Edinburgh, where she established her career in gerontological nursing. Since then, Victoria has been at the forefront of research aimed at improving the health and wellbeing of older populations. Her leadership extends beyond research, as she serves as the Co-Founding President of the Gerontological Alliance of Nurses Australia (GANA) and holds an advisory role on the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission (ACQSC).

Professor Traynor's role directly supports Warrigal's values of Integrity, Respect, Compassion and Innovation by providing practical tools to better understand and respond to the unique needs of each person in our care.
